That is why it is important to connect research and policy in effective ways to ensure that the knowledge helps us accelerate progress towards achieving the SDGs.”

This project, focused on Knowledge Brokering & Synthesis (KBS), serves to bring the insights of the three other research consortia together and make sure that the research outcomes become more than the sum of their parts.

To do so, the project will analyse, synthesise and disseminate the research findings and pro-actively build bridges between academics, policymakers and development practitioners to facilitate multidirectional knowledge exchange.



Main Research question(s)

What are effective ways of building bridges between SDG research and policymaking realities to stimulate fruitful knowledge-exchange for improved policy design and implementation?
